Prince of Peace has an option for parishioners to make their financial contributions on-line. If you would prefer to contribute on-line instead of using envelopes, go to the Prince of Peace website at:

Click on “Enter Website” at the bottom of the screen.

Click on the **E-Giving** link at the bottom-left of the page.

At that point, you can set up your account. The options are:

Set up a reoccurring transaction on the dates you select and your donation can be charged to your credit card, e.g., every week, once a month, etc.

Set up a reoccurring transaction on the dates you select and your donation is withdrawn from your bank account.

If you'd rather not set up reoccurring transactions, you can login to E-Giving every time you'd like to make a contribution.

E-Giving sends an email to you every time your donation is processed so you have a record.

After setting up your account, please call the Parish Office at 547-0356 and inform them that you will be making financial contributions on-line and will no longer require envelopes.

<p><b>First Eucharist &amp; Reconciliation:</b> All children baptized in the Catholic Church who have reached the age of seven years are eligible to receive Reconciliation and First Eucharist. Our Sacramental Preparation Team guides parents and children to help them grow in God’s Love as they journey towards the Lord’s Table. Each child must also be enrolled in a religious education class.</p>	<p>Melody Smith</p>	
<p><b>Confirmation – (Youth)</b> may celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation when they are in the tenth grade and are at least 15 years of age. In addition to the Confirmation program, each confirmand must also be enrolled in a religious education program. <p><b>Confirmation – (Adult)</b> Adults who have received their first Eucharist and wish to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation participate in an eight week process usually beginning in Lent.</p>	<p>Sister Dolores</p>

<p><b>Marriage Prep: Marriage Mentoring</b> Couples journey with couples preparing for marriage as well as providing support to all married couples in their marriage vocation by offering programs and activities throughout the year.</p>	Sister Dolores	
<p><b>RCIA: Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults</b> is the process through which new adult members enter the Catholic Church. This process is also open to both members and non-members of the parish who are interested in just learning more about the Catholic faith. The process culminates with Rites of Initiation at Easter Vigil.</p>	Sister Dolores	
<p><b>RCIC: Rite of Christian Initiation for Children:</b> Similar to RCIA, RCIC is a program for children between the ages of 7 and 17 who have not been baptized or who are baptized but have not received their 1<sup>st</sup> Holy Communion. RCIC is open to both parishioners and non-parishioners who are in need of preparation for these Sacraments and for reception into the Roman Catholic Church at the Eater Vigil. All music is provided. Rehearsals are on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 PM – 8:00 PM in the Church Commons.</p> <p>The <b>Church Orchestra</b> is open to any band and orchestra instrumentalist from middle school through adult. You must bring your own instrument to rehearsals. All music is provided. Rehearsals are on Wednesday evenings from 7:00 PM – 8:30 PM in Church. The Church Orchestra plays weekly at the 11:00 AM Liturgy.</p> <p>The <b>Cantor</b> helps to lead the singing at the Liturgies. The Cantor Ministry is open to any singer from middle school through adulthood. Cantors also assist at weddings and funerals. POP has one to two weeks each year.
